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If yes, give a brief description and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	Yes, the college has a strong management information system in place. It is through this MIS, that the principal get information regarding the functioning of the institute. This information is processed and the data generated is stored for further uses. These uses are in the form of reports by the principal. Since the size of the college is quite large (student strength 4328), for quick decision making and smooth functioning, decentralization of management is very much required. This is brought about through 2 Vice principals, IQAC Coordinator, 19 HODs, Office superintend and 52 committees. In the beginning of the academic year a
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selfmapping exercise is conducted for the faculty to bring out strengths of each of the faculty. Accordingly the principal nominates chairpersons of various committees and further in consultation with the chairperson, the members of the committees. A notification regarding responsibilities and guidelines for working of the committee is issued. Accordingly the committee prepares the action plan and submits for the approval to IQAC. After approval, the committees carry out the activities during the academic year and submit the report at the end of academic year. All these activities are mentioned throughout the year and evaluated at the end of the year by IQAC. For day to day functioning of the college following are currently operational

- College Development Committee: It is constituted as per the Maharashtra Public University Act 2016. It is the highest body to make decisions about the development, extension and smooth functioning of the college.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell: It is responsible for assurance of quality education in the institute. It in coordination with College Development Committee effectively monitors the functioning of the college. It prepares perspectives plan of the college and after approval from CDC, implements it throughout the year.
- FinanceBudget committee: decisions are taken to allocate budget of various heads. Purchase committee invites requirements from all departments, accordingly invites and finalizes quotations and vendors and ensures uninterrupted supply of quality materials.
- Infrastructure - Building committee accesses infrastructural requirements and put in the CDC meeting for its approval and then communicates to the parent trust accordingly. It also monitors the working of housekeeping agencies.
- Research Research Committee motivates the staff to write research proposals to various funding agencies. Committee tries to inculcate research environment among the staff and students.
- Collaborations and Linkages - The College has signed 22 MOUs with various academic and research organizations, banks, business hours and industries.
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Examination - The examination committee prepares and displays internal examination schedules and observes the smooth conduction of theory and practical internal as well as University examinations. It also makes necessary arrangement for Central Assessment Program and timely declarations of results. The grievances are promptly addressed and resolved.

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Our college is affiliated to Savitribai Phue Pune University, Pune. The College runs different University approved U.G. and P.G. programmes and self designed B.Voc. programs. To attain the teaching and learning objectives, the college has processed effective curriculum delivery strategy as follows :

- At the beginning of every semester, the Principal call faculty meeting for academic planning for effective implementation of all the curriculum of all programs.
- At beginning of the year, the Principal addresses first year students and gives information of different facilities available to the students.
- For effective curriculum implementation and execution, The IQAC prepare Academic Calendar and sets learning objectives and are then communicated to the faculty and students.
- The Heads of the Department conducts a faculty meeting for workload distribution, methods for effective delivery of the curriculum, innovative teaching methods and various techniques to be adopted by the faculty by using ICT tools available for teachers and students with sufficient provision of all infrastructural facilities and other necessary services.
- The IQAC monitors and evaluates Teaching, Learning, Co-curricular, Extra-curricular, extra mural, Research and Community activities.
- The success of Teaching-Learning method is further ensured through Result Analysis, Students Feedback and their Progression.
- Within the given framework of the University curriculum, the teachers are free to devise their own innovative teaching methods, including the use of ICT and other available resources that fulfill the needs of the students.
- There is a continuous enrichment of the Central Library and departmental libraries by adding the latest titles, reference books, periodicals, journals, Digital Library with audio-visual study material.
- Some Departments have developed practical handbooks standard sheets / Protocols etc. for performing the experiments on revised syllabus with feedback from different stake holders like alumni, Industrial experts, the teachers of other colleges etc.
- Presently, Six members of the teaching staff are the members of the Faculty, Board of Studies and subcommittees of SPPU for restructuring and revision of the syllabi.
- From Result Analysis, Students Feedback and their Progression, the advanced learners are encouraged to participate in different project competitions and Remedial teaching has been conducted especially for the slow learners by almost all the departments.
- For Hands-on Training, the students take up Industrial Training and Projects in Industries. Bridge Course is conducted by Commerce Department.
- Guest Lectures, Frequent Industrial and Field Visits provide an opportunity to the students to interact with various Academic and Industry , Research experts and on-field experience Industrial fields.
- The College has Linkages, Collaborations and MoUs with different Organizations, Banks and Private Companies to avail the facilities, faculty

exchange and hands on training. • Through international, national conferences , the teachers , experts in different subjects have provided valuable inputs to the students on the current global scenario. • NCC and NSS units of the college, in association with several NGOs, undertake surveys on the various issues of social relevance.

##### 4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

Facilities Use Policy Central coordination of facility allocation will ensure

that facility is used effectively and efficiently. This policy also provides a framework for the optimal use of physical assets as well as regular review of the College's space needs. Classroom scheduling is enables students to attend classes and prepare their schedule accordingly and institutional resources are used efficiently. Allocation and usage of classrooms are decided by TimeTable committee. The classrooms are allocated according to number of Programs and student strength of each class. The timetable is designed in such a way that there is optimal use of classroom space. Faculty with health issues or physical disabilities will be given priority to schedule their classes at appropriate classrooms. The class which has enrolled "Divyang" students will be given priority in assigning the classroom which is easily accessible. For such activities, permission must be taken by organizers from the Principal of the college. Permission is given to use the classroom so that it should not conflict with academic classes' schedule. The schedule of laboratory is decided by timetable committee with the help of head of the departments in such a way that the laboratory is used optimally. In addition to practical sessions, the laboratory space is used for research purposes by faculty and students.

Authority to allot the space for research purpose is given to head of the department. Administrative office spaces are rooms or cabinets assigned to one or more individuals on a regular basis containing furniture and other equipment and used by administrative and support staff. The principal of the college allocate the required space to individual in the administrative office.

**Maintenance Policy** The college has stated maintenance policy of facilities. The routine cleaning and maintenance of classroom and physical space is performed regularly as per policy. Renovation, alteration, and improvement of the existing academic, research, and support buildings is decided by the Principal in consultation with concerned head of the program. The requirement for this is made to Management of the college and after their permission the work is carried out. For maintenance of IT infrastructure and Electrical fittings and appliances separate computer technician and electrician are appointed for day to day technical needs as well as replacement and repair requests. Computer technician looks after maintenance of IT resources like computers, printers, replacement of toners, software problems, networking problems. Electrician is responsible for replacement or fitting of light tubes, bulbs, switches, MCB boxes. Technicians are available throughout the day. If the problem is major it should be brought to the notice of principal. This document provides policy for maintenance of all types of equipment held throughout departments. Maintenance policy ensures that equipments are always in ready and reliable condition as well calibrated to provide good quality outputs. Heads and faculty in the departments are accountable for proper use of equipment. If maintenance or repairing of equipment is necessary, head of department takes care of this.

The college practices decentralization and participative management. The college forms various committees at the beginning of every academic year. These committees are formed in such a way that judicious numbers of members are accommodated for carrying out the activities. Every committee plans its activities at regular interval of time and conducts the activities throughout the year. As per statutory provision in Maharashtra University Act 2016 the college has established College Development Committee. The CDC acts as a link between the PDEA management and the college. Meetings of CDC are held regularly to discuss issues related to overall college development, students and faculty development. The IQAC is established in the college as per NAAC guidelines and it plays a pivotal role at academic and administrative level. Fifty Two five different committees are formed in the college to look after different types of activities. Representatives of the management, the Principal, faculty members, staff members, students, eminent personalities and alumni are part of the committees. The college administration is decentralized through head of the departments, faculty members, Committee chairman, members and office staff etc. Under the supervision of the Principal, Heads and committee members prepare plans for organizing curricular, co curricular and extracurricular activities. These plans are approved from concern authorities and implemented accordingly. While preparing plan and its implementation, views of stakeholders are taken into account. In the decision of purchasing of equipment and upgrading of infrastructure every faculty member as well as heads of the department are involved. case study : Library committee and purchase of Books and Journal The college has a library committee which looks after the functioning of library. Every year two regular meeting of library committee are held. In the meeting, library committee decides the budget for purchase of books, journals and allied items for each programme. Each head of the department after discussion with faculty prepares the list of books and journals to be purchased. The list is submitted to the librarian. Librarian putsforths the requirements in the library committee and take approval for the lists. the librarian get quotations from different dealers and comparative charts are made by the librarian and chairman of library committee. The comparative chart and the proposal for purchase ie submitted to the principal. Principal forwards these to management for approval. After approval from the management, the purchase of subscription get complete by the librarian. Once the books are received in the library along with the bills, the price of each book and discount rates is verified by the library staff in Acquisition Section. Entry for each book is made in the Accession Register with all the relevant details of the book like its price, publisher, vendor, year of publication etc. Then the bills are processed for payment with the accession numbers entered against each item. Acquisition Section certifies the above procedure before forwarding the bill to the Accounts Section.

The payment vouchers are signed by the Accountant, Office Superintendent and finally the Principal. ? These vouchers are checked by the auditor and cheques are issued to the concerned parties. Further, this is again verified and checked by the tally system. ? The Audited Accounts Statements of the funds received from BCUD under the Student Welfare scheme, NSS and extramural activities for organizing seminars are reaudited by the University authorities concerned. External Audit: The external audit takes place annually after the completion of every financial year. The Chartered Accountant, who works as an auditor is appointed by the parent institution, PDEA. The audit program extends over on for 8 to 15 days during the month of May. The external auditor checks Accession records at three levels viz. 1) The checking of Accession record of the library. 2) All the purchase records and dead stocks of the laboratories. 3) The dead stock and equipment of the gymkhana. The nature of the payment is categorized into 1) Revenue Expenditure and 2) Capital Expenditure This is also checked by the auditor. The bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure are checked. The vouchers and proper record with the concerned Department of the capital expenditure is also checked and verified. Departmental Accession Register, Dead Stock Registers/Purchase Registers are physically checked. After final checking of records, the external auditor signs the receipts and payment. For the grants received from the various funding

agencies like UGC, DSTFIST, DBTSTAR utilization certificates are prepared according to the allowed expenditure under various heads. This is duly checked by the CA and submitted to the concerned authorities. This is also audited by the external auditor nominated by PDEA. Apart from internal and external audit Statutory external audit and assessment of Income and Expenditure and Receipt Payment is also carried out by the Auditor General of the Government of Maharashtra periodically after every five years. Audited statements of Utilization of DSTFIST and DBTStar are also uploaded on PFMS portal. Other Audits: ? Joint director of higher education under takes the audit of salary grant. ? ## 7.2 – Best Practices

### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

I] Cyber awareness and literacy Cell in collaboration with Quick Heal Foundation:Our Institute has taken great initiative to protect networks, devices, programs, and data from attack, damage, or unauthorized access. Department of Computer Science has established CALC (Cyber Awareness and Literacy Cell) in association with Quick Heal Foundation (QHF). They provides training to students regarding cyber security, safe and responsible practices online. These volunteers then conduct training programs for others in schools and colleges. They receive a stipend for conducting these sessions. QHF offered one day training to 28 CALC volunteers and 2 mentors of our computer science department. These volunteers delivered 154 presentations and lectures in 52 schools near Hadapsar. In all 31,978 students were benefited. Volunteers received Rs. 1, 88,400/ as a remuneration from Quick Heal Foundation. A Quick Heal Web Portal Support was developed by staff and students to obtain a single point of access for information. This web portal involves access control, authentication, privacy, and security management. Apart from increasing awareness, this activity provided professional exposure for the trainers while also creating an alternate means of revenue generation. II] Social Responsibilities and Enrichment:1. Our college provides help to shape a student's perspective about the Community, boosts the sense of social responsibility. Under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan 120 students and 12 staff members visited 5 villages. Conduction of Focus Group Discussion with the Gram Panchayat -school, hospital, household, shops etc. Geographical locations were studied using GPS technology. Physical, socio-economic and cultural aspects of the villages were studied. Watershed Development program was organized in nearby villages in which 110 students along with staff members participated. Under this program training was given for soil analysis, water management, ecosystem approach, climatic zones 2. College systematizes enrichment activities like sports and cultural which give them chance to extend them and to grow in their area of expertise. Students have participated in almost 20 cultural competitions at inter and intra college levels. Twenty nine students have received awards at different ranks and these achievements have made our college one of the best college in cultural activity in this area. Our Sports Department aims in providing physical training, sports activities which enhances the overall development of students by providing various sports facilities. Around 388 students participated in different sports at different levels. Our hand ball team has received 02 gold medals in intercollegiate competition, 01 gold in Ball badminton and in wrestling at inter university

level.04 students were selected for handball competition at inter university level. For different sports, 05 students at National level, 04 students at state level, 11 students at inter college level were selected

Distinctiveness of the institution lies in developing holistic approach by incorporating social attribute among students. Along with this, motivation is given to students to participate in cultural events and sports activities. 1. Social attribute includes participation of students in various activities of National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Credit Core (NCC). Two cadets have participated in Thal Sena Camp (TSC) in 2019 at New Delhi. 2. Institutes work hard for personality development of students. This is acquired by motivating students to take part in cultural events. The college organizes wide range of enrichment activities which includes sports and cultural along with academics. Many students have participated in Singing, Dancing and Instrumental Competition. Students has bagged 1st prize in "Purushottam Karandak" in one act play in state level competition on 20/8/2018. These activities help to broaden students' education beyond their principal course of study. These activities give students with special talents, a chance to extend them and to grow in their area of expertise. Students have participated in almost Twenty cultural competitions at inter and intra levels. Twenty Nine students have received awards at different ranks and these achievements have made our college one of the best colleges in cultural activity in this area. 3. Our Sports Department aims in providing physical training and sports activities which enhance the overall development of students. Sports department provides various sports facilities like Volleyball, Handball, Chess, Table Tennis, Yoga and Gym. Around one hundred and fifty students participated in sports at different levels. One hundred and thirty students participated in zonal level chess competition. Intra college body building competition was organized by our parent institute at its Head Quarter, PDEA at our institute in which one hundred and eight students participated. Our hand ball team has received two gold medals in intercollegiate competition, one gold medal in Ball badminton, and one gold medal in wrestling competition at inter university level. 04 students were selected for handball competition at Inter University level. In different sports, five students at National level, four students at state level, eleven students at inter college level were selected.
